Standard 1: History of the United States and New York

Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate their understanding of major ideas, eras, themes, developments, and turning points in the history of the United States and New York.

Standard 2: World History

Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate their understanding of major ideas, eras, themes, developments, and turning points in world history and examine the broad sweep of history from a variety of perspectives.

Standard 3: Geography

Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate their understanding of the geography of the interdependent world in which we live—local, national, and global—including the distribution of people, places, and environments over the Earth's surface.

Standard 4: Economics

Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate their understanding of how the United States and other societies develop economic systems and associated institutions to allocate scarce resources, how major decision-making bodies function in the U.S. and other national economies, and how an economy solves the scarcity problem through market and nonmarket mechanisms.

Standard 5: Civics, Citizenship, and Government

Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate their understanding of the necessity for establishing governments; the governmental system of the U.S. and other nations; the U.S. Constitution; the basic civic values of American constitutional democracy; and the roles, rights, and responsibilities of citizenship, including avenues of participation.

Each activity is designed using a common inquiry model (C3) and can be presented quickly from a single computer and projector or modified for students' hands-on engagement. Collections of 15-20 activities per topic enhance your curriculum throughout the year. These 15-minute instructional activities use interactive maps (geographic) to enhance your academic instruction of standards-based topics from grades 4-12.

GeoInquiries are composed of three parts: a PDF teacher guide, an interactive webmap, and an optional student worksheet.

Pedagogically, GeoInquiries provide a multi-layered inquiry arc around the map and data within. These questions provide an instructional toolkit for interrogating the map spatially and conceptually.

There are the 8 key parts of a GeoInquiry teacher PDF, available in every Esri GeoInquiry.

- 1) Standards alignment, relevant to the content area
- 2) Active link to the web map
- 3) Five-stage inquiry process (5E or geographic inquiry depending on collection)
- 4) Two "tech tip" boxes
- 5) Activity extensions
- 6) Common textbook alignment
- 7) Feedback URL (also note activity version to the left)
- 8) Creative Commons identifier

GeoInquiry Levels: GeoInquiries are available in two levels: 1 and 2.

<u>Level 1 GeoInquiry</u> maps require no login, no installation and will run on any computer or device. Level 1 activities are intended to help students see patterns and think spatially about the concepts in the maps. Level 1 GeoInquiries use visual analysis by the learner.

<u>Level 2 GeoInquiries</u> use the analysis tools in ArcGIS Online and require learner visual interpretation of those analyses. Level 2 activities need an <u>ArcGIS Online Organization for schools</u> (<u>free from Esri</u>). Using Level 2 activities and maps requires users to have at least "Publisher" permissions to use the analysis tools.

Government: Suitable for AP Government, Economics & Politics and Participation in Government/Civics Courses: This collection includes a range of topics such as elections, Federalism, rights, and comparative government
